Snow routes

The City of Regina thought its first run through clearing newly marked snow routes went pretty well over this past weekend.

“Right off the bat we saw a 20 per cent reduction in the time it took to do that plow on a five-kilometre roadway,” said the city’s manager of winter maintenance Chris Warren.

Portions of Winnipeg Street, College Avenue and Victoria Avenue are being tested this winter season, with 24-hour parking bans in place after a snowfall so that plows and graters can clear streets quicker and more efficiently.

Regina’s first snow route of the year has shown some positive results.

The snow route, a five-kilometre stretch including Victoria Avenue, Winnipeg Street, and College Avenue, is an experimental area where cars are not allowed to be parked while crews clear the streets.

Chris Warren, Manager of Winter Maintenance, says the city is already seeing a huge improvement.

“We’ve seen, with our communications plan and signs posted, there is a very minimal number of cars parked on the streets when we are doing a plow,” Warren said. “For example, last year, there were about 140 cars parked on a 5 km stretch of road. This year we had about 50 leaflets, trying to educate offending vehicles.”

Government okays money for outfitter association

Saskatchewan's ombudsman has ruled there were conflicts of interest in the recent actions of five councillors from three Saskatchewan rural municipalities.

Mary McFadyen, tasked with investigating municipal complaints, looked at the RMs of Grayson, Orkney and Beaver River.

In Grayson, McFadyen found a council member who managed his father's construction company participated in a council decision to rezone land to allow for a campground development. The construction company had previously worked with the developer, who had received an estimate from the council member to build the campground for \$500,000.

According the summary report, "McFadyen found that the council member should have known that participating in these decisions gave him an opportunity to further his private interests. Because he did, ratepayers could not be sure he had acted in the community's best interests."

The council member resigned from council, so it was unnecessary for McFadyen to make any recommendations.

In Orkney, the RM's waterworks operator was also a council member. According to the report, the council member was "at the meeting when the council first appointed him and at meetings when his invoices were approved," and that he should have declared a pecuniary interest and not participated in the decision to hire himself.

It was recommended council vote again on whether the man should be the waterworks operator and the RM accepted the suggestion.

Three councillors were involved in the RM of Beaver River investigation. There, council members, according to McFadyen's report, "participated in discussions and decisions to test for gravel on leased Crown lands when they were in a conflict of interest and did not take steps to deal with their conflicts."

The report outlines how one councillor took part in a decision to check for gravel on land he leased, while two others participated in decisions to test for gravel on land leased by their close relatives. McFadyen recommended the council take conflict of interest training and pass a bylaw to adopt improved procedures, but, the RM did not accept that because council members "felt they had done nothing wrong."

McFadyen's office has received about 1,000 complaints since being tasked to oversee municipalities in 2015.

Roughly one-third of those concerned RMs. Some 22 per cent involved cities, and 17 per cent were about towns.

Government OKs \$107K more for outfitters' organization

SASKATOON

The Saskatchewan Party government has now committed more than \$350,000 toward a new hunting and fishing outfitters' organization, which critics contend is little more than an expensive new name and logo for an existing association.

Premier Brad Wall's cabinet on Oct. 30 approved \$107,000 in new funding for the Saskatchewan Commission of Professional Outfitters (SCPO), adding to the \$248,000 provided to the organization during the last two fiscal years.

The money is expected to cover the cost of developing an outfitters' code of conduct, a plan to deal with "rogue" outfitters, a trip deposit insurance program to ensure hunters and anglers aren't stranded, and a web strategy, according to a copy of the government contract.

Elliott Maduck, owner of Swan Lake-based Truly Canadian Outdoors and a longtime critic of the SCPO, noted it has few members and said the government appears to be wasting its money on an organization most of the province's 600 outfitters do not need or want.

Government officials have said previously that membership dues will make up the majority of the SCPO's budget. According to its website, the organization has 150 members, meaning its revenues from memberships — which cost up to \$393 — is around \$58,000. Roy Anderson, the SCPO's acting chief executive, declined to comment.

Ministry of Environment provincial wildlife manager Chuck Lees said the government expects more outfitters to join once they see the benefits. He said the \$107,000 is targeted — rather than ongoing — funding aimed at building programs that will benefit the industry.

Asked whether the programs could result in additional fees for non-member outfitters — who are separately licensed by the province — Lees noted there are no plans to make membership compulsory.

Proposed in November 2015 as a replacement for the Saskatchewan Outfitters Association (SOA), the SCPO was expected to have mandatory membership. That changed in March 2017, leading some to question why it was needed at all.

Traditional ceremony puts focus on water concerns

FORT QU'APPELLE Lorraine Yuzicapi was born on the edge of Echo Lake and remembers clear water in her childhood.

Now, at 73, she sees the Qu'Appelle waters as "green and slimy" lakes that are killing fish, animals and plants.

Yuzicapi was one of five pipe holders during a pipe ceremony at the Treaty 4 Governance Centre in Fort Qu'Appelle on Tuesday.

About 80 people attended the ceremony, which was held to raise awareness of a project proposed by the Quill Lakes Watershed Association. It intends to build a 25-kilometre channel to divert surface water from Kutawagan and Pel lakes toward Last Mountain Lake.

The lakes are saline, and there is concern that diverted water would be hazardous to the Qu'Appelle water system.

The provincial government has not approved the project, but has determined that it does not require a detailed environmental assessment or public consultation, as it does not qualify as a development.

"We've lost our voice. In the (environmental impact assessment) process, they engage the stakeholders. They've eliminated that, so our voice has been removed," said Aura Lee MacPherson, chair of Calling Lakes Eco Museum and a member of the Saskatchewan Alliance for Water Sustainability (SAWS).

"We're very concerned about the salinity, we're very worried about our fish, we're very worried about the amount of water," said MacPherson.

She referenced the raw sewage in their water, which floated downstream from Regina in 2014, and a proposed Yancoal potash solution mine near Southey.

"We're not opposed to economy, but we want development done right. We've taken a lot and now they want us to take the salt of the Quill Lakes (watershed project), and we're saying it's too much. We haven't thought about this enough," she said.

"The lake has gone down 19 inches and I believe if our government starts enforcing and closing some ditches, we have time," she added.

"The lake went down, so let's work together and find a solution."

MacPherson said the proposed drainage project has divided the community.

"People don't even say hi to each other anymore," she said.

"It's a divisive process and our government has done that to us. I feel bad for the farmers, because the provincial government has said, 'Here, you guys solve this problem,' but they didn't give them any capacity So they came up with a ditch."

She said Saskatchewan could look to its neighbouring provinces for alternatives.

"There is a division and it seems to be those that are environmentally friendly or green friendly versus those that aren't," said Wendell Starblanket, a member of the Starblanket First Nation and a traditional helper during the pipe ceremony.

"When we look at how our political organizations are structured, how our current world is structured, when it comes to environmental issues and resource issues, it always divides people and it's always over money and it's always over the resources and who gets what," he said.

MacPherson would like to see a collaborative process involving all levels of government — including First Nations and Metis — as well as universities, farmers and resource industries.

"We believe the solution is working together," she said. "We believe we can build a stronger Saskatchewan sustainably, rather than just moving a problem from one place to another and giving it to someone else."

During the pipe ceremony, Yuzicapi represented the Dakota people, while four men represented the other linguistic groups of Treaty 4 — the Lakota, Nakota, Cree and Saulteaux.

They took turns praying aloud in English and in their First Nations languages.

One man shared a memory from childhood: "The elders told us that one day this water would be hard to get."

"Without water, none of us would be here. Without water, we wouldn't have life," he added.

Collin Starblanket sang and drummed as people prayed and smoked "kinnikinnick," a mixture of red willow, sage, sweetgrass and cedar.

Smoke filled the big teepee as about 50 men, women and Bert Fox High School students sat in their respective circles, passing pipes around and tapping the pipe on each of their shoulders. About 30 others sat in chairs around the room and observed.

The discussion continues Wednesday as the Qu'Appelle Valley Environmental Association hosts a monthly meeting at 7 p.m. at the Centre for the Arts in Fort Qu'Appelle.

Finance Minister Donna Harpauer says “no decisions have been made” regarding layoffs in light of a large union rejecting the province’s proposed 3.5-per-cent wage reduction.

The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW), a union representing almost 1,800 SaskPower workers, voted overwhelmingly against the rollback, first proposed by the Saskatchewan Party government in the unpopular 2017-18 budget, which aims to eliminate the province’s \$1.2-billion deficit over three years.

Announcing a 3.5-per-cent wage rollback in the public service was arguably the biggest initiative in the budget.

IBEW is one of 25 public-sector unions negotiating with the province, which originally budgeted to save \$250 million through the cut. That target was later reduced to \$125 million, in part over concerns unions were not willing to accept a reduction.

Harpauer said collective bargaining with public-sector unions will continue but “it doesn’t look promising.”

A \$300-million contingency fund was built into the budget and it is possible Harpauer dips into that money as a way to cover the costs tied to unions unwilling to take the 3.5-per-cent cut.

“It’s concerning, because it’s large dollars and resource revenue is down and so we’re looking for that money,” she said, adding the government was hopeful unions would follow the lead of MLAs who took a wage reduction.

The 3.5-per-cent wage cut is the carrot being dangled by the government to its public-sector unions, but the province also has layoffs as a possibility in its back pocket.

The minister said no decisions have been made regarding layoffs.

Instead she said: “We want to keep all of our workers; they do a great job, but somehow we also have to make ends meet.”

Harpauer is in a bit of a unique position for a finance minister, particularly when it comes to dealing with the 3.5-per-cent wage cut and government’s three-year, back-to-balance plan. Each of the five people running to be the leader of the Sask. Party has their own plan for the public sector and the deficit. And whoever wins the Jan. 27 leadership vote will be the new premier, and Harpauer’s boss.

Opposition NDP critic Warren McCall said IBEW’s rejection leaves the Sask. Party budget “where we said it was out of the gates.”

“It doesn’t make sense. It doesn’t hold water,” he said.

In August, when the \$250-million target was halved to \$125 million, then-finance minister Kevin Doherty was optimistic his new budget goal could be reached.

“We are confident that there is going to be some movement at the negotiating table with respect to our employer groups and employee groups in negotiating compensation settlements, that we’re getting positive reports back,” he said.

GTH structure encourages abuse of system

So far, the story of the Global Transportation Hub has been one of a burgeoning scandal, utterly devoid of any redeeming results or mitigating circumstances.

A provincially driven megaproject which enriched friends of Saskatchewan Party insiders has brought in only two major private-sector tenants — and those only due to sweetheart deals which left the public holding the bill for a failed attempt to conjure up an economic hub.

The lack of any plausible defence or justification for the costs surrounding the GTH has led to the Saskatchewan Party’s utter refusal to talk about the scheme at all, no matter how offensive or unaccountable they need to be to try to change the subject.

But it’s also led to a lack of scrutiny as to the problems which would have arisen if the GTH had managed to accomplish what it was designed to do. And this week, we began to see how the Global Transportation Hub has been set up to encourage abuse rather than to foster fair economic development.

In a new report, CBC’s Geoff Leo has highlighted how the GTH allows businesses to avoid the laws which govern everybody else by relying on legal fictions which bear no resemblance to reality.

So far, that’s manifested itself in the exploitation of immigration rules by Brightenview as part of its plans for a wholesale mall.

The GTH has generally been advertised to investors — and operated in practice — as part of Regina for all intents and purposes. And Brightenview has followed that same path, pitching to investors that their location is “in Regina, the capital of Saskatchewan.”

But that hasn’t stopped the appeal to potential businesses from including special exemptions from investment and employment rules which exist for the sole purpose of encouraging rural development.

At the moment, Saskatchewan’s immigration nominee program requires urban businesses to hire Saskatchewan workers and to invest a larger amount of money in order to qualify. But investors in rural businesses are exempt from those requirements, while also receiving advantages in the assessment of immigration applications.

Somehow, despite piggybacking onto the

City of Regina in terms of both governance and operations, the GTH site is being treated as “rural” — allowing investors to buy their way into Regina with a lower level of commitment than would be required of anybody else.

In other words, the core of Brightenview’s business plan looks to be regulatory arbitrage: setting up an artificial means to access provincial benefits which by all rights shouldn’t apply.

For anybody wanting to see our province governed fairly, that might seem like a glaring design flaw. But it’s actually the core premise behind the GTH’s governance structure.

The GTH has been set up from the beginning to be “self-governing”, with the result that a provincially appointed board is given sole control over what are normally municipal functions.

In some cases, the GTH Authority has punted on that option: for example, its tax bylaw adopts the City of Regina’s rates and provides for the city to perform services.

But while the GTH is intended to be connected to Regina geographically and functionally, it has the authority to set its own planning and development rules — potentially allowing it to set policies and approve developments which would never pass muster if they were subject to review by any elected body.

To date, the Wall government has found very few investors interested in buying into the idea of a democracy-free zone where normal rules don’t apply. But we should recognize the dangers of both setting up such opportunities for abuse, and electing governments which see them as desirable.

RM LEADERS NEED TRAINING

The provincial ombudsman who looks into issues with the governance of rural municipalities has raised real cause for concern.

Mary McFadyen took action in regards to three cases of conflict of interest, involving five councillors. All three cases point to a serious gap in knowledge on an issue on which all elected officials should be well versed. In one case, her guidance on a clearly problematic situation was outrageously disregarded.

The report reveals that one councillor in the RM of Beaver River took part in a decision to check for gravel on land he leases. Two other councillors participated in decisions regarding land owned by close relatives. None of these people apparently saw this as a conflict and they did nothing to remove themselves from the compromising situation.

As reported by Postmedia on Tuesday, the ombudsman called for conflict of interest training and recommended passing a bylaw to adopt improved procedures, but the RM did not accept that because council members “felt they had done nothing wrong.” This was not an onerous request on the part of the ombudsman, and its rejection should raise serious concerns for residents of the RM of Beaver River.

In the RM of Orkney, a council member — who is also the waterworks operator — voted on his own appointment to the job. McFadyen pointed out this obvious conflict, and the RM agreed to hold the vote again without the operator’s participation. Again, this is a mild consequence for a troubling error in judgment.

The final situation, in the RM of Grayson, involved a councillor who should have removed himself from discussions regarding a proposed subdivision. He resigned, and as a result the ombudsman took no action.

This, of course, is far from the first time we have seen such a problem in a rural municipality. Tim Probe, who is currently on leave from his role as councillor in the RM of Sherwood, is set to stand trial on two charges stemming from an alleged February 2016 incident; he was found to have been involved in a conflict of interest by the ombudsman.

The latest incidents are proof that not all rural municipalities have learned from the woes of the RM of Sherwood. And it is difficult to know the true extent of this lack of education on conflict of interest. Almost 300 rural municipal councils operate in Saskatchewan; 185 of them represent fewer than 500 people. Tracking issues is a huge task with few people really watching the inner workings of these elected officials.

Rural municipalities deal with tens of millions of provincial tax dollars. The findings of the ombudsman should alert the government and taxpayers that more accountability is required.

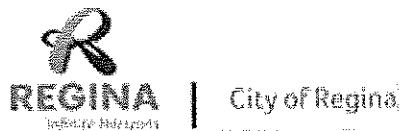

First Band-owned Tim Hortons in Regina

When Keri Ponace learned a Tim Hortons was opening on Sakimay First Nation land on Regina's outskirts, she was determined to be a part of it from the beginning.

She's excited to work on her band's own land — especially in a coffee shop.

“Everyone loves Tim Hortons coffee, so I thought it would be an interesting endeavour,” she said at Tuesday’s grand opening. “Hopefully I can become a manager. My goal is to have more of a leadership (role), so I can show other people what they can do.”

Ponace is now a supervisor in training at the first band-owned Tim Hortons franchise in the Regina area, and only the second in Saskatchewan. The shop near Dewdney Avenue and Pinkie Road is the newest tenant to move into the growing Saulteaux Crossing Business Park, on Sakimay land wedged between the Westerra subdivision and the Global Transportation Hub.

Sakimay Chief Lynn Acoose said the opening was the “culmination of a dream.” The band has long sought to set up a Tim Hortons franchise, which she said will provide opportunities for First Nations youth. That was part of the mandate she gave to the operators, Doyle Hospitality.

“We talked to them early on about ensuring that Indigenous people participate here as employees, not only as counter staff, but as supervisors and managers,” Acoose said. “They’re grooming people to eventually manage our store.”

As of Tuesday, 75 per cent of the employees are Indigenous, coming from numerous First Nations, not just Sakimay. The chief is pleased to see Ponace behind the counter, and is confident she’ll make a good supervisor, noting the young mother has always been “really driven for her family and her community.”

For Acoose, it’s important for her band members to have the option of working on their own land.

“We want to create opportunities for our people to have work on reserve, so they can enjoy the benefits of being a treaty person and working on treaty land,” the chief said.

The opening ceremony attracted politicians from the city, the province and the federal government. Former Regina mayor Pat Fiacco attended in his role as CEO of Sakimay’s business arm, Four Horse Developments.

Fiacco said the franchise will soon be followed by another tenant in the same building, which already houses an Esso convenience store. He has big plans for the rest of the 250-acre expanse of band territory.

“The most exciting development will be at the corner, where the old Saulteaux gas station was located,” he said. “There’s a huge opportunity for us to build an Indigenous cultural centre.”

He said the cultural centre might come with a convention centre, as well as a nearby hotel. Acoose sees the project as a commercial and industrial “hub” for the Westerra community.

Ponace said the development makes her “proud to be a Sakimaniac.”

“For me, it means a great deal,” she said. “It’s just being part of my reserve, my people, and leading Aboriginal people here. (That’s) what we’re trying to do.”

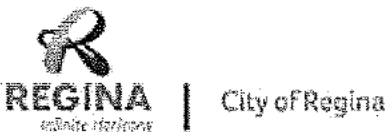

As of Monday, the City of Regina moved to its new curbside garbage collection system, with pickup every two weeks.

City council voted in favour of the move back in September, in a bid to trim \$132,000 from its budget. According to the city, volumes of waste per household drop by 34 per cent in the winter.

From Nov. 20 to March 30, 2018, curbside garbage pickup will happen every other week. For the holiday period between Dec. 23 to Jan. 5, the city will move back to weekly garbage collection.

People can sign up for phone, text or voice mail reminders, or view a personalized collection calendar on Regina.ca/waste.

The city reminds residents of four easy steps for proper use of garbage carts: Fill it — bag or bundle all waste items, keep cart lids closed, don't put additional waste beside the cart; Place it — carts should be rolled out to the curb or alley by 7:30 a.m. on collection day; Space it — leave at least one metre around the cart for collection trucks to properly empty it; Store it — roll the empty cart back to a secure location on one's property.

Residents are also asked to recycle more to divert waste from the landfill. Tips on reducing household waste and properly disposing of waste items are available from Regina.ca/waste.

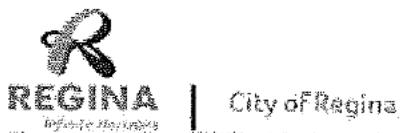

‘Don’t give up,’ mother urges at MMIWG hearing

Survivors traumatized by legal experience, commissioners hear

SASKATOON Sitting through the sentencing hearing of the man who killed her 19-year-old daughter was the hardest part for Gwenda Yuzicappi.

In January 2009, Yuzicappi was in Regina Court of Queen's Bench to see the man who pleaded guilty to second-degree murder for his role in the slaying of her daughter, Amber Redman.

During that process, Yuzicappi heard the tragic details of her daughter's last moments — that she was raped and begged for her life before she was punched and fatally stabbed. The court experience was traumatic.

Victim services workers were present in court, "but it was like they weren't there," Yuzicappi said. Members of Redman's family had poured out their feelings in victim impact statements and didn't know where to look for support. The family had received an autopsy report that detailed how Redman died, but they didn't know how to read it and were shocked when they heard the details in court.

Yuzicappi shared her story on Tuesday in Saskatoon with the commissioners of the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls. She said courts need to change the way they deal with victims and their families.

"We need that support, we need that counselling, we need that culture, we need our teachings to come in — and that wasn't offered," she said.

Yuzicappi last saw her daughter on a July night in 2005. Redman — a happy, fiercely independent woman who took pride in fixing the beat-up car she'd bought after a win at bingo — was going to a Fort Qu'Appelle bar with her boyfriend and cousin.

That night, she got drunk and argued with her boyfriend, who left the bar. He called Yuzicappi the next day to see if Redman had ever made it home. She hadn't.

At first, Yuzicappi wasn't concerned. Redman was the type of person who was happy to go off on her own and likely needed time to cool off after the argument, she told the inquiry. But days passed and she still didn't come home. Her boyfriend filed a missing person's report four days later.

For two years and 10 months, Yuzicappi and the police searched for Redman. Yuzicappi told the commissioners she blamed herself for not calling police sooner. She liked to stay by her phone and kept her car full of gas so she could get to Redman immediately if she called.

Prayer, smudging and going to sweat lodges helped her cope during that period, but she still suffered from depression and had suicidal thoughts.

The phone call informing her that her daughter's remains had been found on the Little Black Bear reserve was devastating.

"My hope that I had grasped onto for so long, for those two years and 10 months, was gone. My daughter wasn't coming home," an emotional Yuzicappi told the commissioners.

It later came out in court that two men from Little Black Bear met Redman in the bar and invited her back to their home, where she was beaten and later killed.

Little Black Bear is less than 70 kilometres from Standing Buffalo First Nation, where Redman grew up. Yuzicappi said there were rumours surrounding her daughter's death and she can't understand why no one from Little Black Bear told her or the police what had happened.

She said she still has many unanswered questions, including why only one person went to prison for Redman's murder.

In the nearly three years Redman was missing, she became a symbol of the challenges faced by missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls. Today, her likeness is immortalized in a statue outside the Saskatoon police headquarters, which captures her dancing with her shawl transforming into eagle wings.

Yuzicappi said she hopes some lessons can be learned from her daughter's story.

"I know that there is a reason, there is a purpose, within her 19 years of life. There's a purpose in her gifts that she taught me, as her mother, in knowing there are more and more of our First Nations women that are going missing," she said.

"Every day is a tragedy and we have to bring this issue to the forefront and I strongly believe this public inquiry is going to do that. I believe that so strongly that all the family members that are here, that still have loved ones missing, don't give up your hope, keep a grasp, hold onto that hope. Don't give up."

Sask. government must come clean on Regina bypass land deals

Governments are particularly bad at a couple of things:

1. Learning from past mistakes, and;
2. Being open and accountable.

For example, one might think the Global Transportation Hub (GTH) \$103,000-an-acre land purchase would have taught the Saskatchewan Party government all it ever needed to learn on public accountability of tax dollars when individuals stand to make massive profits on speculation.

Of course, one big reason why governments neither learn from mistakes nor choose to be accountable is they see it as an admission of even bigger mistakes.

And so we progress from the GTH scandal to the increasingly nonsensical answers on the ballooning Regina bypass costs.

In Monday morning's question period, NDP MLA Cathy Sproule raised what seems to be the legitimate issue of public disclosure of land costs for expropriation for the \$1.88-billion bypass. But as is often the case in government, what starts out as reasonable can become unreasonable rather quickly.

The NDP MLA noted in the assembly that getting details on ownership and land transactions on the \$82.7 million (according to provincial auditor Judy Ferguson's June 2016 report) in bypass land purchases has been a little like pulling teeth.

Sproule released a lengthy letter from the registrar of titles in the Ministry of Justice explaining why making it easy for the public to know whose land the government is buying — land most often under expropriation — is not something Information Services Corp. (ISC) and the land registry has much interest in doing.

"Our policy is deliberately cautious in order to ensure that we meet public expectations with respect to information that in other contexts would be considered private," wrote Karen Banks, registrar of titles, in her Aug. 11 reply to Sproule. The letter goes on to suggest the NDP or anyone else "can still access the information using the standard search methods."

Given that you "can still access" the information in the standard manner, are you truly meeting "public expectations" on information "that would be considered private"? It was a nonsensical response to what's actually a reasonable inquiry that would ensure both seller and buyer (which would be us taxpayers) are getting fair value for land under expropriation.

"The biggest tool a government has is to take someone's land," Sproule said later in an interview.

Sproule explained the Opposition had started the process of gathering information on specific bypass land ownership last spring. The NDP received a response to a request for the seller of each property that included information in 199 properties, telling us the size of each parcel, the total land cost (both property and "damage cost") and appraised value. The government withheld names and legal land descriptions.

The NDP MLA requested the Sask. Party government provide the necessary details, rightly noting that costs (\$10 per every parcel inquiry) and time (again, the government didn't provide the legal land descriptions the Opposition requested) made doing individual searches of each property ridiculously prohibitive. Moreover, Sproule said she was actually told by a client service representative at ISC this summer — prior to the letter — that it could provide a map with names. Here's why it's needed: We know from this information there were 22 parcels of bypass land appraised at \$85,000 where the government paid as little as \$630.12 and as much as \$3,182,810.92. There are 49 parcels appraised at \$5,000 where we paid as much as \$782,748.68 and as little as \$56.84. Untoward? Maybe not, but who knows?

That we heard Monday government backbenchers — the same guys who have blocked pertinent witnesses coming forward on the GTH — hollering at Sproule "do your own homework" simply underscores that learning from past mistakes and being open and accessible is becoming an increasingly foreign concept.

Even without the history of land flipping at the GTH, one might think the Sask. Party would want to be as forthright as possible.

That it doesn't seem eager to detail these land-deal transactions should be worrisome for us all.

The Saskatchewan government has a new policy on naming landmarks after former premiers.

The announcement of the policy came from Premier Brad Wall as a ministerial statement Wednesday, and follows recommendations made in a report by former lieutenant-governor Gordon Barnhart.

“I think it’s reasonable that we would have a formal policy for naming things after former premiers,” Wall told reporters.

Along with the policy announcement, it was revealed that provincial landmarks would be named after former premiers Ross Thatcher, Grant Devine and Roy Romanow.

Earlier this fall, the Regina Public Schools Adult Campus was opened in its new location under the name the Allan Blakeney Adult Campus — a decision Wall said was made knowing the policy was being developed. “Regardless of how you feel about politics, all of these three individuals — four including premier Blakeney — contributed greatly to this province,” Wall said.

Wall noted the government worked with the former premiers or their families to ensure each felt the naming process was being handled appropriately.

Interim NDP leader Nicole Sarauer shared some common ground with Wall on the issue.

“It’s an absolute honour to be able to serve our province in that way, as premier,” she said.

“It’s important that we honour those who did serve and I’m happy to see that today.”

Under the policy, buildings or landmarks that do not already have the name of a person can be named after former premiers, except for the immediate past premier, according to a government press release. The following name changes have been made under the new policy:

The main building at Saskatchewan

- Polytechnic’s Moose Jaw campus is now named the W. Ross Thatcher building.

The reservoir and dam near

-

Alameda are now the Grant Devine Lake and Grant Devine Dam.

The Saskatchewan Provincial

-

Laboratory in Regina is now the Roy Romanow Provincial Laboratory.

The government will look for a building or landmark to name after former premier Lorne Calvert once Brad Wall leaves office, the release states.

University of Saskatchewan political studies professor Joe Garcea feels the policy gives the government a certain licence.

“This is a policy that says, despite the controversies that are out there, we’re going to commemorate our political history,” he said.

“We know that in today’s day and age that’s getting increasingly sensitive, because a person that some people see as a virtuous politician, others see as less virtuous,” he said.

Garcea said he expects to see some debate on the new policy, noting that some will argue the recognition and naming can be used as a tool to help people learn the history of the province.

Others, he said, may raise concerns that the practice could be viewed as partisan when it comes to choosing exactly what buildings and landmarks are named after whom.

On the topic of Indigenous names, Wall told reporters it's something the government has been giving consideration to.

Garcea noted that it was significant that the government included a "cooling off" period in the policy, wherein recent premiers don't qualify, which he said might help avert some criticisms.

When Wall was asked what he would like to have named after him when he becomes eligible, he quipped: "There's a Pink Floyd record, there's a street in New York. I'm good."

Province's homicide rate at highest level in 39 years

Despite a continued general decline in the national homicide rate, Saskatchewan's 2016 rate was at its highest in almost 40 years.

According to figures compiled by Statistics Canada for its Homicide in Canada, 2016 report, Saskatchewan reported 54 homicide victims last year for a rate of 4.69 per 100,000 population — according to StatsCan, the province's "highest number (of victims) since the inception of the Homicide Survey in 1961 and its highest rate in 39 years."

The increase, the report noted, was in part due to eight additional gang-related homicides in this province.

Regina Police Service Chief Evan Bray said gang violence plays a role in the city's homicide rates, often coming in combination with drugs, alcohol and firearms.

"That is a lethal combination, literally, when you put those groups together," he said, adding there is a lot of volatility between gangs that sparks violence.

Of Saskatchewan's 13 gang-related homicides, more than half were reported outside of the province's two largest cities. But the percentage of Regina's gang-related homicides was high, at 50 per cent in 2016.

Meanwhile, one-quarter of the city's homicides were firearm related.

As well as the increase in gang-related homicides from five (11.4 per cent of 2015 homicides) to 13 (24.5 per cent), Saskatchewan also reported an increase in firearm-related homicides, rising from 11 (25 per cent) to 17 (33.3 per cent).

Those 2016 percentages are roughly on par with national averages in the case of gang-related homicides and, in terms of firearms, below the national average of 38.3 per cent.

The 4.69 rate proved more than enough to push Saskatchewan into the unenviable top spot among provinces, with the next highest being Manitoba at 3.19 per 100,000.

While the province's rates rose, Saskatoon and Regina numbers stayed the same or dropped, suggesting the increase is due to homicides that occurred outside Saskatchewan's largest cities.

Saskatoon recorded 10 homicides in both 2015 and 2016 with an overall change in population likely behind a small rate decrease from 3.21 to 3.12.

Meanwhile, Regina's rate saw a somewhat larger drop from 3.72 to 3.23, in part since the number of homicide victims went from nine to eight (the RPS recorded seven, suggesting the eighth happened just outside city police jurisdiction).

Despite those decreased rates, both cities remain well above the 2016 national average of 1.68, and Regina reported the third highest homicide rate among all census metropolitan areas in Canada (only Thunder Bay and Edmonton were higher).

While Regina police have been successful in curbing some trend based crimes, such as auto theft and arson, Bray noted homicide is very tough to predict and prevent.

That said, he pointed out police are working to bring down domestic conflict numbers — and therefore domestic homicides — through its recently unveiled strategy in that area.

In terms of gangs, Bray said police are constantly working on enforcement and suppression, and are also partnering with schools on the prevention side.

He added police are in the process of setting up a gang-exit strategy program.

"I think if we can do some work to try and minimize the effect that gangs have, work on domestic-related assaults that can escalate to homicide, those are some of the preventative things that we can do as a police service to try and mitigate the chance of homicides happening in our city," he said.

The report also examined the number of Aboriginal homicide victims, with Saskatchewan coming in with the highest rate at 18.88 per 100,000 Aboriginal people — a 17 per cent increase over the previous year.

Bray said the figures contained in the report are not surprising, although they are obviously a concern given each number represents a human life lost.

"Let's not forget we're talking about brothers and sisters and husbands and wives and parents that are losing their lives ...," he said. "It goes without saying, but it has a lasting effect on our community and really can be the cause of many other social misfortunes that happen after that homicide occurs."

Local advocate buoyed by new national strategy

For Melissa Coomber-Bendtsen, the most exciting part of the national housing strategy announced Wednesday is the consideration of women and families.

“How women and children recover from and deal with homelessness is different, and that is reflective in this strategy,” said Coomber-Bendtsen, CEO of the Regina YWCA.

Eighty per cent of women who stay at the YWCA’s local shelter, My Aunt’s Place, are fleeing violence. Also, most of them have children.

Because safety is a concern, rehousing women and children is more complex than rehousing a single homeless man, she said.

“It becomes a much more complex need when we look at where we’re going to house them. What are some of the safety concerns and then some of the support systems needed when you add complex trauma?” said CoomberBendtsen.

The 10-year, \$40-billion housing strategy commits at least 25 per cent of funds to projects for women, girls and their families.

“The advocacy work we’ve been doing about the intersectionality of violence and homelessness, this strategy speaks to that intersectionality and how closely connected gender-based violence is to homelessness and housing needs,” she said.

The YWCA has been part of Regina’s Housing First pilot project, working to house and support chronically homeless people in conjunction with Phoenix Residential Society, Carmichael Outreach, Street Culture Project and the YMCA.

This national strategy “allows us to have a Housing First strategy moving forward,” said CoomberBendtsen, “particularly in Regina as we start to plan what that ... plan to end homelessness is going to look like.”

The Homelessness Partnering Strategy is currently seeking a consultant who can devise a plan to end homelessness in Regina.

The national strategy “may change our times where we could eradicate homelessness, and that’s the plan we want to have,” said Mayor Michael Fougere.

“But it doesn’t change our working with partnerships to ensure that we can get to functional zero homelessness sometime in the next year or two.”

The federal government stated that federal, provincial and territorial governments would jointly fund the strategy. It said \$2.2 billion would be committed specifically to reducing homelessness.

Fougere's biggest complaint with the strategy is its vagueness — a lot of questions remain.

"Is this transfer money contingent upon provincial money coming in as well? Don't know that yet. What's that mean for Saskatchewan? Not sure about that yet either," said Fougere.

He hopes those questions will be answered "as soon as possible."

"We'd like details because we're trying to move forward very aggressively on homelessness and we want to make sure that we have support from the federal government in a substantive way over a number of years into the future," he said.

He said every city in the country has concerns with addressing social housing and affordable housing, so "the fact that they're talking about it is good news."

The national housing strategy aims to reduce chronic homelessness by 50 per cent, create 60,000 new homes, repair 240,000 existing homes, protect 385,000 households from losing an affordable place to live, and house 530,000 families or people in need.

About 1.7 million Canadians are in need of housing.

Time for 'serious laws' on racism

It's time for 'serious laws' on racism, inquiry hears

Homicide victim's cousin describes Saskatchewan as a province full of hate

SASKATOON Marilyn Wapass says she doesn't believe the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls will fix the systemic causes of violence against Indigenous women, but she still drove more than 200 kilometres to testify before the inquiry's commissioners.

"I have no faith in this inquiry because it represents a system that has oppressed me, that is killing our people," Wapass told a commissioner on Thursday, the last day of the national inquiry's community hearings in Saskatoon.

"But I'm here because of (my sons), because of the children. I'm here because of my friends who have lost loved ones and are still looking, because they need that voice and we need to keep going, we need to try."

Her cousin, Maxine Wapass, went missing from Saskatoon in May of 2002.

Her remains were found later that year in a shallow grave near Asquith, about 16 kilometres west of Saskatoon.

Maxine's ex-boyfriend confessed to police that he killed her, and was charged with manslaughter in connection with her death. However, a Saskatoon Court of Queen's Bench judge ruled in 2004 that the exboyfriend's videotaped confession was inadmissible in court because the RCMP sergeant and Saskatoon police constable who interviewed him "went too far" when they continued to question him even though he'd said more than 60 times that he wished to remain silent. Without the confession, the judge found insufficient evidence to convict him.

"How does that happen? How does somebody who confessed to taking a human life, how do they get away with that?" a tearful Marilyn Wapass asked the commissioner. "That day that that judge made that decision he sent a very strong and powerful message. He sent a message to the rest of society that it's OK to kill Indigenous women."

Wapass, who lives on the Thunderchild First Nation, described Saskatchewan as a province full of hate. She said the Saskatoon police officer who handled her cousin's missing person case didn't seem to care whether Maxine was found or not. She said the justice system appeared to protect the man who was charged with killing her sister. She criticized the school system for not offering enough education about Indigenous issues and lambasted the media for their portrayal of Indigenous people.

"My reality is that I have to wake up every morning and I have to go out and walk in society and I'm going to get mistreated, I'm going to face racism and so will (my sons); that's their reality," she said.

She told the commissioner changes need to be made in every aspect of society and every level of government in order to improve conditions for Indigenous people.

She said something needs to be done about racism.

"People need to start being charged for hating, for bringing hate into this world. There need to be serious laws made against racism."

Her testimony was among the last to be heard during the Saskatoon community hearings for the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women. The three days of hearings were scheduled to wrap up on Thursday evening.

The federal government has asked the inquiry to complete its final report by November 2018, but the inquiry has indicated it may need more time.

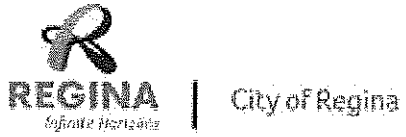

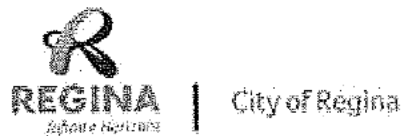

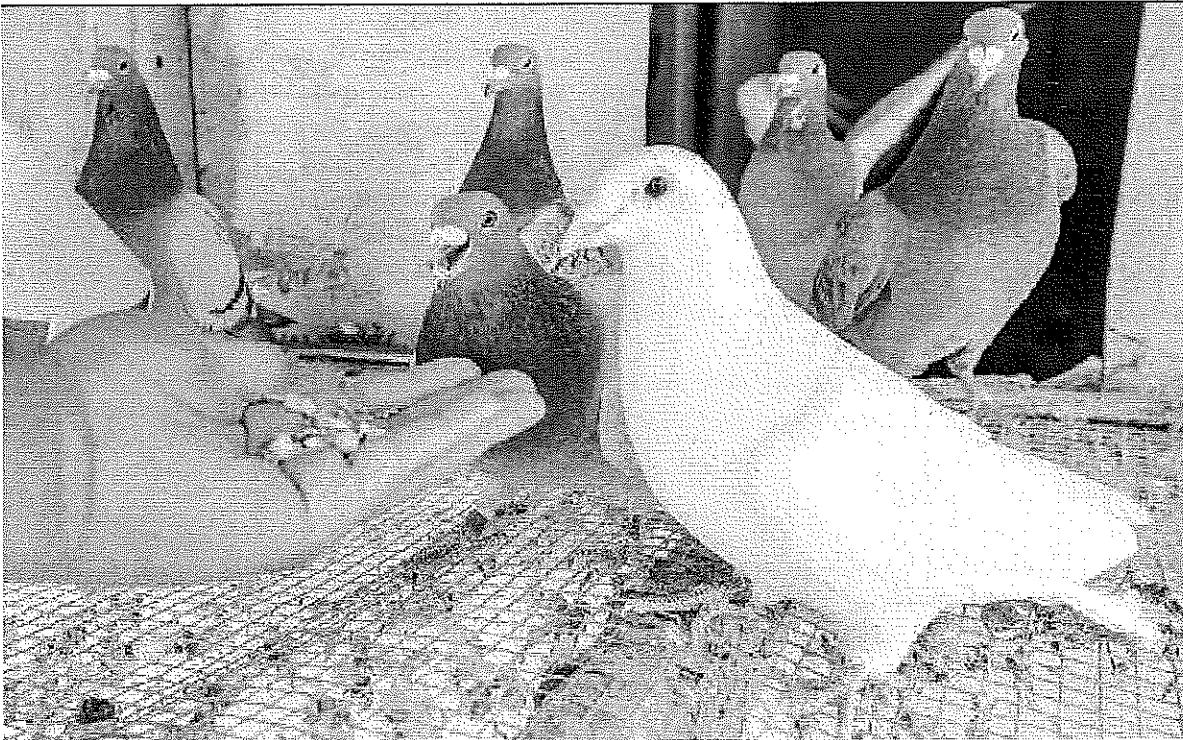

Immigration rejuvenates local pigeon racing scene

November is moulting season in Orville Lopez’s pigeon loft.

It’s an important time for his pigeons — he can’t remember if he has 36 or 38. They’re shedding last year’s plumage, and growing the feathers that will take them through the next racing season. Moulting is a demanding process. The birds need plenty of corn, and oily seeds like canola and flax, a task Lopez sees to twice each day.

“I don’t look at it as work,” he said. “I guess I just like having birds, having a pet, having to feed something in the morning and night — something to take care of.”

Lopez is used to caring for pigeons. He did it as a boy, on a family farm in rural Bulacan, a province in the Philippines.

“It’s always been a part of our life,” he said. At 20, Lopez is the youngest member of the Regina Racing Pigeon Club.

The next youngest is 55 years old. Across the province, pigeon racers are getting older. With few exceptions, their children and grandchildren don’t seem to have much use for the sport.

But pigeon racing is a big deal in Asia. The Philippines alone now has more than 70 racing clubs, according to web directories. That interest carries over to Saskatchewan, where a growing population of young Filipino immigrants are carrying on the racing tradition.

“I think pigeon culture in the U.S. and North America is kind of dying,” Lopez said. “But then in Asia it’s just kind of booming. Younger guys are getting into it.”

Modern pigeon racing was born in Belgium, with the first major race dating back to 1818. Specially bred birds are raised in small shacks called lofts, and trained to fly back from increasingly long distances. Competitors release their birds from a single spot, often hundreds of kilometres away. They time their birds electronically, measure the distance back to each loft and crunch the numbers. The fastest bird wins the race.

The sport first spread to the U.K., Germany and the Netherlands. European immigration brought it to North America by the late 19th century. In recent decades, it has gone global, with hundreds of clubs sprouting up on six continents. International demand has pushed up pigeon prices at auction — with top birds selling in the tens or hundreds of thousands. In 2015, a Chinese businessman bought a Belgian pigeon for about \$400,000.

Lopez saw his first pigeon race as a child. Back then, he viewed pigeons as a hobby, or a form of therapy. “They can be stress relievers,” he said. “It makes you feel a lot better about your day.”

AVIAN ATHLETES

He soon learned that his hobby could be turned into a sport, and his pigeons into avian athletes.

“I realized there was a thing called racing pigeons,” he said. “There were actually people in my neighbourhood, my dad’s cousins, they actually had the top bird in the club.”

Lopez watched the races. But he never got a chance to join in. When he was 10, his family moved to Canada. He had to leave his birds behind.

Meanwhile, Juni Villafuerte was winning prize money at pigeon races near the Philippine capital, Manila. He joined a 5,000-member club and once saw his pigeon place third in a 520-kilometre race. It earned him 15,000 pesos, almost \$400.

“I love racing,” the 30-year-old Villafuerte said. “You’re waiting, waiting, waiting and you find out, oh, it comes home. It’s unexplainable that feeling.”

Like Lopez, Villafuerte had to leave his pigeons in the Philippines when he came to Canada, about five years ago. He felt shock coming to a new country, and took time adapting to the culture and climate. In the Philippines, he remembers warm winter nights spent on the streets, staying up late, chatting with friends about pigeons. Suddenly, he was dealing with -30 C temperatures in Regina. He wanted to race.

“In the Philippines it’s a big thing,” Villafuerte said. “You miss it if you’re in another country. Everything that brings you back home, you want it, for sure.”

Lopez found the Regina Pigeon Racing Club when he was 17. He remembers his first visit. He was “a bit scared.” The members were much older, with some about 50 years his senior.

But he soon became part of what he calls “the pigeon community.” Older men like Marvin Gilewicz, 68, shared breeding tips, and even gave him birds to help build up his flock.

“The older guys are helping me out,” Lopez said. “They knew their stuff. I always asked them what to do for next year, and what should I be doing better. They always tell me to pair the best of the best.”

Now, Lopez is competing in multiple races each year, including a flight from Winnipeg back to Regina.

Gilewicz, a decades-long veteran of the Regina club, said membership has drifted between eight and 12 over his tenure. While he views the club as “stable,” he said younger relatives aren’t stepping up to take over. He knows the old timers won’t be around forever.

“We’ve had a lot of members that have passed away over the last couple years,” Gilewicz said. “With the internet and everything moving so fast, and their careers, younger people are dropping out.”

Some clubs are in worse shape. Saskatoon’s went inactive just a few years ago. Former club president Ken King, 69, said they once had about 20 members, but “a lack of flyers” pushed that number deep into single digits.

“People are all getting older,” he said, “and we don’t have a lot of younger people coming up. Unfortunately a lot of them have passed away or gone into care homes where they don’t have pigeons.”

Moose Jaw has also hit tough times, according to club treasurer Bill Harris. In the ’80s, there was a schism among the city’s pigeon racers. Heavy competition produced “turmoil” and “a bit of a falling out.” But waning numbers forced the racers to mend the divisions and reunite.

Slowly, the remaining members are passing away, and so are their pigeons.

“Those pigeons get disbursed and there’s no one to take over,” Harris said. He remembers one man who passed his birds to his wife as he got sick. Now that he’s gone, she’s just waiting for the flock to die off.

“I’m not raising any baby ones,” Harris paraphrased her as saying. “When these ones are gone, they’re gone.”

Harris, 71, said that none of his four kids have much time for his pigeons. Instead, he’s shared some with Lopez — birds with “good potential.” Harris believes young men like Lopez could be the future of the sport. He said the Philippines are a big source of new recruits in Calgary and other large Canadian cities, as are India, China and Lebanon.

FILIPINO RACERS

King agrees. He knows of four Filipino pigeon racers in Saskatoon and four in Prince Albert, all in their late 20s or 30s. He said they’re thinking of consolidating to form a united club — and he’ll be there to provide guidance.

“They’re projecting for young birds in 2018,” he said. “Their enthusiasm is greater than mine, but I said I would help them in any form or fashion.”

In Regina, Lopez isn’t the first Filipino racer, and he probably won’t be the last. Since 2006, Regina’s Filipino community has grown sevenfold, reaching 8,405 last year. Gilewicz is aware of two more “upcoming members” from the Philippines, still in the process of breeding and training their birds.

Villafuerte hopes to join them. He met Lopez through relatives. They got to talking, and discovered their mutual love of pigeons. Villafuerte now stops by to help out with the birds, and joins his friend for meetings at the club.

He said he’ll seek official membership as soon as he has his own backyard — big enough to hold a pigeon loft.

“Once I have my own place, I’ll have my own birds for sure,” Villafuerte said. Lopez has already promised him his pick of breeding birds to start a flock — just like Gilewicz and Harris did for him. Villafuerte already has his eye on some “colourful” pigeons.

But he'll have to do his homework. When it comes to racing pigeons, it's not beauty, but bloodlines, that makes a winner.

"Some pigeon bloodlines are only for distance," Villafuerte said.

"Some pigeons are small for just short distance. And then if you just cross them, I'm thinking, that would be nice-bred pigeons."

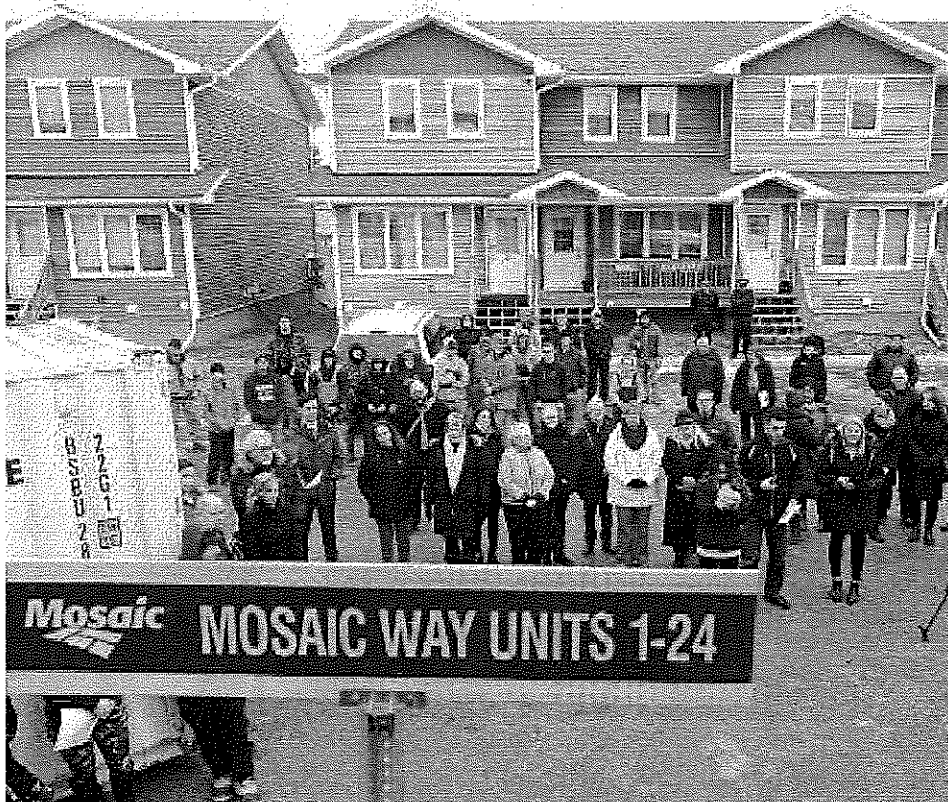
Villafuerte said he'll train his pigeons at least every second day, taking them a little further from their loft each time. First a few metres, then a few blocks, then kilometres and kilometres. They have to learn how to find their way home.

For Lopez, that's the only thing that really matters.

"It doesn't matter if you win the race or you lose the race," he said. "The important thing for me is the bird comes back home."

10 families get keys to new Habitat homes

Humanity's Haultain Crossing project in Regina is the organization's second-largest development in Canada. On Monday, a crowd watched as 10 families received the keys to their new homes in the development after putting a total of 5,000 hours of work into the construction.

Ten more Regina families are now homeowners, courtesy of Habitat for Humanity of Regina.

The new houses are in Haultain Crossing, Habitat's largest development in Saskatchewan and the second-largest in Canada. Monday's "key ceremony" — handing over keys to the owners — also marked other milestones for Habitat, as the first laneway within the development was unveiled and the group completed its 106th home.

"I'm proof that all (Habitat Regina's) hard work is making a huge difference," Jackie Gerlach, one of the new homeowners, said in a news release issued Monday.

"When times have been tough though this process I've dusted myself off, hung on to my faith and pushed forward to change the legacy I'd be able to leave for my children. I want to inspire all the single parents out there that being a homeowner is possible for them."

Construction in Haultain Crossing began in 2015 and is to be completed in five phases. By 2020, the development in the Eastview neighbourhood will hold 62 houses and be home to between 200 to 250 individuals.

Fourteen families have been living on site for more than a year in Phase 1, and now with Phase 2's key ceremony, 10 more families will join the small community — for a total of 24.

Habitat Regina received funding for the homes' construction from the federal and provincial governments, and the City of Regina. Habitat Regina has also worked with several local and provincial businesses to fund the construction of the homes within this phase. Two of the 10 homes were built by Trades and Skills Construction Apprenticeship Program (TASCAP) students.

The 10 families receiving homes put a combined 5,000 hours of work into the construction.

Lawn parking

Louise Folk, the city's director of development services, said the municipality is aware that improper parking is an issue in the Hillsdale and Whitmore Park neighbourhoods.

She said workers respond to bylaw complaints regularly in the area in hopes homeowners will voluntarily comply. "Currently, if the property owner does not voluntarily comply with city regulations for front yard parking, the city must follow a process defined in provincial legislation which involves issuing a legal order," she said in an email to CBC. "The property owner has the right to appeal this order, which can add several months to the process to resolve the complaint."

The email said it is not possible to enforce illegal parking in front yards by issuing a parking ticket. Changes to the bylaws that would help address the problem are under consideration.

Council

City council has approved \$37 million in spending to buy and renovate the STC building.

The building should be substantially completed for a Regina Police Service headquarters expansion by early 2020, according to an administration report, which also notes that the spending will nearly wipe out two budget reserves. Mayor Michael Fougere celebrated the approval at Monday's council meeting.

"This is a good day for us. It's a good day for the city," he said. "It's a good day because we're seizing an opportunity."

High drivers face similar penalties as drunk drivers

Province will have zero tolerance for motorists impaired by drugs

People caught driving high on Saskatchewan roads will face similar consequences as those driving drunk.

With the federal government set to legalize marijuana in 2018, the province is introducing changes that will allow for the use of drug-detection devices by police officers who suspect a person behind the wheel has used narcotics.

If found to be on drugs, people will face similar consequences as they do now for driving while intoxicated.

If charges are laid, a driver can have their licence immediately suspended and their vehicle seized for 30-60 days.

There are also administrative charges through SGI, including a one- to five-year driving suspension, fines up to \$2,500 and requirements to complete an educational program.

SGI Minister Joe Hargrave said using drug recognition devices for roadside testing will increase the chances of conviction.

By having a zero-tolerance rule in place for people who are driving while on drugs, Hargrave is hoping to slow Saskatchewan's high rates of impaired driving. Zero tolerance, in the province's view, essentially means any level of cannabis detected in someone's system by a federally approved screening test.

"The science behind the alcohol impaired driving has been around a long time, the science behind the cannabis, or drug impaired driving, hasn't been around for very long," he said when asked about the rationale behind the zero tolerance.

A little over 65 per cent of people agreed or strongly agreed that the same penalties for alcoholimpaired driving should apply to drug impaired driving in a survey done by the province.

“Impaired driving is impaired driving” said Hargrave, noting officers will have to have sufficient reason for stopping someone for impaired driving and that he doesn’t care if it is legal drugs, illegal drugs or alcohol, because “we cannot have impaired drivers on the road.”

Introduced Tuesday, this is the first legislation introduced by the province in response to the federal government’s long-standing agenda to legalize cannabis.

It’s expected other pieces of legislation will be introduced before July 1 when marijuana becomes legal, but when the province will do so remains unclear. The current legislative session ends on Dec. 6. It is not out of the realm of possibility for the province to introduce at least one more piece of legislation related to the file before then.

There have been hints the province will allow the private market to sell marijuana, but still unknown is the age in which people will be able to legally consume the products sold by vendors.

Already the province has spent considerable time contemplating the impending legalization of cannabis on July 1. Saskatchewan and other provinces asked the federal government for more time to prepare, despite the move being telegraphed for several years.

The federal Liberals campaigned on the issue in the 2015 election. After they won a majority government, they stated their intent to legalize cannabis before 2019, before tabling legislation allowing for that earlier this year.

Council debates spending

German club celebrates glockenspiel victory at council

Alvin Knoll was saddened to see Regina's glockenspiel rusting away in an outdoor lot this year, parts of its ironwork broken off, the concrete pedestal discarded.

But now he sees it as a blessing in disguise.

"I'm looking at it on the positive side," he said. "We'll get some upto-date paint."

Knoll is now confident that the glockenspiel will chime again, after city council voted to consider committing up to \$350,000 toward returning the landmark to its former home in Victoria Park.

The Regina German Club, where Knoll serves on the executive, has been lobbying to get the glockenspiel back since it was removed in 2010, during construction of City Square Plaza. It had stood on that site since 1986, after the club and the multicultural centre donated it to honour Regina's history of German immigration.

"I'm quite certain that everyone is quite happy with city council's decision," Knoll said of the club's membership. "There are many members on the city council that are very heritage-minded, geared that way to the cultural needs of the city."

Councillors voted 8-1 to consider the funding through the 2018 capital budget. The price tag comes in well under an initial \$500,000 estimate. Knoll said he's hopeful it can be "trimmed down" even more. Proponents are looking for local tradespeople, and Knoll knows of a sandblaster who's willing to volunteer his time. Maintenance is expected to cost \$4,000 annually.

Mayor Michael Fougere said he supports the spending outlay.

"We have an obligation to restore this," he said. "We made a mistake by removing it and not putting it back in the first place."

But Coun. Jason Mancinelli spoke out in opposition, saying he couldn't support spending money on a glockenspiel in a tight budget year. "We had some hard decisions to make," he said. "I won't be able to support this because it's too much to spend for something that isn't essential."

NEW CLAPPERS, ELECTRONICS

According to the plan, the money would pay for new clappers for the glockenspiel's 23 German-made brass bells, and a three-sided clock to sit on top. It would also fund a new control system. Knoll pointed out that the glockenspiel was originally run by a Commodore 64, one of the earliest machines in the history of personal computing.

"Unfortunately that was a very dated piece of equipment," Knoll told council. "It did expire."

Coun. Jerry Flegel, a strong supporter of the restoration project, said the exterior of the glockenspiel is in "good working order." He agreed with Knoll on the need for updated electronics, however.

"We can't use a Commodore 64 anymore, we're gonna upgrade," Flegel said.

He also addressed concerns raised by the nearby Knox-Metropolitan United Church. In a submission to council, the church cautioned that the glockenspiel shares the same “sonic space” as its bells. It called for a plan “to ensure that the manual rung bells toll in harmony with other music in the park.”

Flegel pointed out the glockenspiel will only sound twice each day, at 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

The plan also calls for students at the University of Regina’s Music Department to research and record “culturally authentic” German tunes for the glockenspiel to play. Knoll said the music will be a pleasant addition to Victoria Park. For centuries, he stressed, glockenspiels have served to bring communities together.

“It’s always placed in the middle of town, the marketplace,” he said. “The history of the glockenspiel, of course, has to do with the gathering of people and the ringing of the bells.”

According to Knoll, Regina is the second city in Canada to have a “state-of-the-art glockenspiel,” after Kitchener, Ont. He called it an “asset,” and a way to honour German culture in Regina.

For Flegel, it does much more. He said the glockenspiel will again be a “focal point” for all of downtown, a gathering place for Reginaans of every background.

“It’s not just for the German people,” he said. “It’s for all cultures.”

The STC building deal wasn’t the only big-ticket item on Monday’s council agenda. Councillors approved a multimillion-dollar loan guarantee with little debate, but argued fiercely over a few tens of thousands for volleyball. In a tight budget year, every penny counts.

WATER TREATMENT

Regina’s water supply is at the mercy of outdated electrical circuitry 53 kilometres away, according to Mayor Michael Fougere. So council stepped in to guarantee a loan to fund updates at the Buffalo Pound Water Treatment Plant. It totals \$45 million, with Regina covering \$33.3 million and Moose Jaw backing up the rest. That will count on the city’s balance sheet, bringing Regina about \$100 million short of its debt limit. But administration is confident it won’t compromise the city’s credit rating, and Fougere said action was urgent.

“If the electrical component to the plant goes out, we have about, I believe it’s 24 to 36 hours of water supply,” he said. “We have to get it fixed. So this is absolutely critical to southern Saskatchewan.”

The motion passed unanimously.

VOLLEYBALL

Council voted to contribute \$50,000 to support the Saskatchewan Volleyball Association bid to host the 2019 Volleyball Canada National Championships at Evraz Place. But it took a long time. Two councillors tried, unsuccessfully, to amend the motion to bring the cash grant down to \$40,000 or \$25,000. Coun. Lori Bresciani said it’s difficult to pay for volleyball in “tough economic times.”

But Coun. Jerry Flegel argued that the games will help boost the city's economy. A representative for the volleyball association estimated 12,000 people will show up, bringing millions of dollars of spending money with them.

"If we start nickel and diming on things that are going to be coming into the city, we're going to put ourselves in a pickle," said Flegel.

The money is conditional on the bid's success.

ZONING

Council considered a long list of zoning amendments that could help ease retail development, expand housing access and bring licensed restaurants to new neighbourhoods.

The owner of the Hunter Gatherer Vegetarian Diner addressed council first. He said he wants to serve beer and wine to his patrons, but can't do it under the zoning bylaw. In response, council voted to make licensed restaurants a discretionary use in neighbourhood commercial zones, which are scattered in residential areas across the city.

They went on to pass bylaw amendments to speed up the application process for restaurants, box stores, triplexes and fourplexes in various zones.

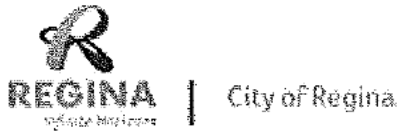

Lawn parking

Louise Folk, the city's director of development services, said ticketing drivers isn't possible under current bylaws. In an email statement, she said that the city is considering changes that may address the problem. She said that the city currently has to issue an order and give the property owner time to appeal, something that can add "several months" to the process. Bylaw officials try to push landlords to comply on their own, something that's successful in about 80 per cent of cases.

"The City recognizes that improper parking is an issue in the Hillsdale and Whitmore Park neighbourhoods and regularly responds to bylaw complaints," she said.

But if landlords don't comply, the complaint ends up with planning.

Coun. Barbara Young said that front-yard parking is one of the top three complaints she hears from residents in her ward, which includes Hillsdale and Whitmore Park. She said she's been working with the community associations on the issue for a long time. A bylaw review could lead to changes that will strip planning of its responsibility for front yard parking, she said.

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As Alan Stephen prepared to address an executive meeting of Eden Care Communities, he knew he was in for “a great challenge.”

“It’s not a fun challenge,” he quickly added. “My challenge now is to sit there and say, ‘Now what do we do? How do we find a mechanism that can provide funding for these individuals?’”

He means the 170 or so people who live in Eden’s affordable housing building on Broadway Avenue known as Milton Heights. On Monday, Stephen learned that Regina City Council will not phase in about \$33,000 in property tax increases due for the property – about 40 per cent higher than what they paid for 2016.

If Stephen’s executive team can’t find the funding to fill that hole, it could mean a nine-or-10-dollar rent increase for the residents. It’s money he says many can’t pay.

“These people are struggling,” he said. “They’re very low-income. A cost of nine or 10 dollars a month has a huge impact.”

Stephen, the charity’s CEO, said he’s determined to avoid hiking rents.

“That will be our board’s decision,” he said. “My recommendation to the board is to protect our residents at all costs.”

Monday’s council meeting saw universal recognition of the work Eden staff do to help their high-needs residents — taking them to the library, buying groceries, helping out with banking, or just being there to lend a hand. But the word “precedent” kept coming up around the council table, with many worried about who would come next looking for tax abatements.

“We all know that this is good work, by good people, helping out people who need help,” said Coun. Bob Hawkins, who chairs the finance and administration committee.

He said it was with a “heavy heart” that the committee recommended against Eden’s request.

“We have to be very cautious about tax exemptions,” Hawkins warned. “We will have before council many, many care homes in the city in the same situation, asking for this tax exemption. There is a danger in doing this as a one-off.”

But Coun. Andrew Stevens countered that the entire commercial sector gets phase-ins for similar increases. Coun. Lori Bresciani backed him up, and stressed that there’s a shortage of supportive living homes in the city. She said she visited Milton Heights, and was convinced the residents can’t bear higher rents. They currently pay anywhere from \$679 to \$979 per month, she learned, leaving most with only a few hundred each month for personal expenses.

“We are talking about our most vulnerable,” she said. “I saw it today. We are talking about people with nowhere to go.”

But Hawkins pointed out that Eden has never actually evicted anyone. Ultimately, he brought a majority of council around to his view. Only four – Couns. Stevens, Findura, Bresciani and Flegel – supported Eden’s request.

Council signalled that it’s looking into a formal policy for property tax phase-ins for residential units like Milton Heights. But it will take time for staff to craft a policy, and more time for council to vote. That’s time Stephen doesn’t have.

“These folks are going to suffer this 40-per-cent increase this year,” he said.

Stephen said he sympathizes with council’s concerns about eroding the tax base during a budget crunch. Eden is in a similar situation, after all. He doesn’t hold the decision against them.

“I didn’t see council sitting there saying ‘screw you Stephen,’” he said. “I saw them squirming, I saw them hurting, and saying ‘how do (we) do this?’”

He said he’s still considering an appeal to the board of revision to challenge the assessment that led to the big tax hike. Eden will also be looking for grants from the city, something a number of councillors suggested they might be more open to. The organization — a registered charity — will also be looking for donations from the public. They’re holding a fundraising gala on Dec. 8.

“This is a collective effort, through the entire community,” he said. “We’ve gotta find a way.”

Contingency fund empty as deficit projections drop

Saskatchewan’s finances remain “on track” to get back to balance, but all of its contingency money is gone.

According to the province’s midyear financial update released Wednesday, the 2017-18 budget deficit projection is \$679 million. That is \$6 million less than what was estimated in March’s budget.

A \$300-million contingency fund built into the budget as just-in-case money will cover the cost of \$250 million worth of compensation savings the province budgeted for in March but failed to achieve.

The province is asking public-sector workers to agree to a 3.5-per-cent compensation rollback.

“Right now, we’re not even remotely close in savings,” said Finance Minister Donna Harpauer said.

The three-year back to balance budget plan still calls for the compensation savings, but the province is now forecasting it won’t achieve the target this fiscal year.

Harpauer admitted the \$250-million savings plan was “definitely a risk in our budget because we knew it would be hard to achieve.”

NDP finance critic Cathy Sproule said the province running out of its contingency money was “kind of predictable.”

Taking that risk — and coming out on the losing end — means the \$300 million in contingency money is all spent, with four months to go in the current fiscal year.

Adding to the province’s financial woes is a decrease of \$53 million in projected revenues.

Much of that is due to an overall drop in projected money coming in from taxes. Despite the province increasing taxes by nearly \$1 billion in the budget, the revenue expected to be generated from that increase is down \$181 million since March.

An increase to and an expansion of the provincial sales tax (PST) were introduced, including removing the exemption on construction materials, but because already-in-place construction contracts were grandfathered, the increase did not apply in all instances. The province estimates it could have brought in \$95 million more had the exemption been removed immediately.

A similar situation took place with insurance for agricultural producers, dropping projections down about another \$25 million.

“It’s a little bit lower than we projected because of the timing of how it applied to insurance as well as the grandfathering of construction projects, so it’s still a significant contribution to this particular revenue (item),” said Harpauer, who pointed out total taxation revenue is still projected to be about \$245 million more than the previous year.

Sproule said that the province should have been better prepared when it announced the changes to the PST.

There are signs of optimism in the non-renewable resource sector sprinkled throughout the government documents outlining the mid-year finances, such as increased drilling activity and higher production.

But very little of that positivity is being seen in actual revenue projections, which is now expected to drop \$24.1 million and generate about \$1.4 billion.

“The optimism in the oil industry in particular is ... the considerable increase in the number of wells that are being drilled,” said Harpauer.

While the volume of oil being produced is positive, its selling price is less so. The price of WTI oil was projected to be \$56.25 per barrel in March, but has now been dropped to \$50.25.

Such volatility in the non-renewable resource sector is one reason why, according to Harpauer, the province is “trying to shift our finances toward something more stable” in the form of increased revenue from taxes.

“What we’re seeing here is a government that is not making any headway at all on a \$650-million projected deficit, and that’s disappointing,” said Sproule.

Province expands list of electronic items to be accepted for recycling in May

The provincial government has announced an expanded list of electronic items to be accepted for recycling.

The updated list will take effect May 1, 2018.

New items include countertop microwave ovens, desktop and portable scanners, floor-standing printers, external storage drives and modems, game consoles (including hand-held and accessories), e-book readers and portable and vehicle (after-market) GPS systems.

According to a news release sent out Wednesday morning, the Government of Saskatchewan repealed and replaced The Waste Electronics Equipment Regulations with The Electronic Equipment Stewardship Regulations after consultations with industry and other stakeholders.

“These changes were developed in response to consultations and our ongoing commitment to protect the environment,” Environment Minister Dustin Duncan said in a written statement.

Over the next few months, the Electronic Products Recycling Association Saskatchewan (EPRA) will adjust its program to include the additional items. Similar to programs in B.C., Alberta, and Manitoba, environmental handling fees will be charged at the point of purchase for each item.
